

beat sooner to march in an hour after, all sorts of Baggage to pass the River to night, The *Drum* to be at Pottes at Midnight *M.B.* It was resolved (since we saw no preparation the Enemy were making against Bruseels and that our business was not to fight since we did not pretend to hinder the Junction) to repass the Scheldt to be near to cover our Siege, and accordingly orders were given for the Artillery and Baggage to pass this night. Lt Genl. Ross was detached with 25 Squadrons to secure the Convoy of Ammunition that was coming from Aith and 600 foot were sent to reinforce the Garrison of that place

The Majors of Brigade to be at the Dukes to night at 6 for Orders the *Drum* with the New Guards to be at it in the Morning at Pont Espieres 1000 horse with a Brig: to be there at the same time the six Batt^s: camp'd on the right to be there likewise to march with the *Drum*. The Genl. to beat at 7 in the Morning the Assembly half an hour after to march at 8. to send for the Order of March at 10 to night at Mr Badogans, The Baggage to the Artillery, 400 foot and 100 horse to be to morrow at 8 in the Morning at Audghem to Escort the Breadwaggons to Oudenarde and to bring them back 500 foot at 5 in the Morning at the English Artillery to Escort the Ammunition Waggons to Menin

The Army was under Arms before day but did not March till Noon waiting for the Convoy which M. Ross saw safe into the Camp about 9 of clock and about 2 in the Afternoon the Army began to pass the River at Pottes and came to Encamp the right near Espieres and the left at Audghem the Dukes Quarters at Helchin
