Schedt to be near to cover our Siege, and accordingly orders were
given for the Artillery and Baggage to pass this night. Lt Gen^r.
Ross was detached with 25 Squadrons to secure the convoy of
Ammunition that was coming from Ath and 600 foot were sent
to reinforce the Garrison of that place

The Army was under Arms before day but did not March till
Noon waiting for the convoy which M^r. Ross saw safe into the
camp about 9 o'clock and about 2 in the afternoon the Army
began to pass the River at Pottes and came to encamp the night
near Espieres and the left at Avelghem the Dukes Quarters at
Helchin
