500 Men at Pont a Marquee to be relieved, 100 at Pont a Tressin & 100 to be sent to Pont a Bouvines each Regiment to march into the ground marked in the line of Battle, all Officers to stay at their Posts to send for Forrage for anight, The Baggage to stay at the Artillery till further Orders, the Tents not to be pitched till 3 in the Afternoon the 500 Men at Pont a Marquee to retire to the Hedges on the right where the Horse were encamped, the Picquet of the three Regiments that covers my Lord Dukes Quarters to lie on their Arms and if they hear any firing to advance to the Quarters and in case of necessity the Regiments to take Arms the Baggage to go immediately to the Artillery

N.B. The Enemy came to Templeuve en peve and Mons, en peve, Our Army made amovement to the right and took up the posts w^{ch} were thought most proper in line of Battle to oppose them, the right being near the Deulles at Noyelles and the left running to Peronne by Dushiers to Tretin at Entiers we posted two Brigades of Foot in the Front of the Lines and the whole Army encamped in order of Battle as we expected the Enemy, Prince Eugene's Troops which came to join us having the Right, The English & Danes made the left and the Dutch in the center. The Army was drawn up in 3 Lines, the first all horse being in the Plains & the Second all Foot, the third a reserve de Reserve & 20 Battalions were posted on the flanks of the Horse, in this manner we expected the Enemy who gave out they would attack us My Lord Orkney was to be posted at Tretin with all the English Foot, The Enemy
