

first Line are to encamp along the Entrenchments two Tents deep and the second Line to encamp in their own ground at 5 o'clock Fascines to be sent for behind the Hanover Foot to make the Entrenchment higher and better. for every one of the Enemy's Cannon those who bring them to the Artillery shall have 3^d. A Sergeant to be sent with the Men for Water 150 of the Danes of the second Line 100 of them to have Tools for Work to beat the Mill of Fretin immediately the picquets of both lines to be at the Entrenchments at night MB. The Enemy begun the cannonade about 7 in the morning and continued to Fire furiously the whole day with 40 pieces mostly great Cannon they had sent for to Donway without doing any great damage. The Army continued under Arms till towards the Evening Prince Eugene was with his Troops on the right where the Enemy seemed to be Fortifying in the enclosures about Seclin as if they designed to raise Batteries there, in the Evening we encamped the first Line in the Ground where they were posted in the Entrenchment and the second where it had been, this was two days we had been in line of Battle waiting the Enemy but we found they only designed to harraß us and retard the Siege so it was resolved that Prince Eugene should go back with his Troops and leave us to defend our Entrenchments where the Picquets of both lines were ordered to lie upon their Arms. This night the Enemy drew off their Cannon having killed and wounded us about 30 Men with 2 days Cannonade.
