

it before and encampt much in the same ground the right at Welen and the left running from Templew to Pontachire where it made an Angle and run down the River towards Pasavanne to front the Enemy who were encampd on the other side of the River from the Abby of Falserge to Herincos and Pottes, we found the Enemy had laid two Bridges over the River at Warcoin which we went to reconoitre and Orders were given for all the Grenadiers of the Army to be in a Readiness to march with the Genl of the Day to Attack 'em.

The Qu. M^t to be at Merdyth's Regt. at 5 in the morning, 300 Men with a Major &c. to be at Lumley's Regt. at midnight, the heavy Baggage to remain and march with the train to morrow, no Genl to beat but the Assembly to be at 7 in the morning and to be ready to march half an hour after, the Qu. Ma^t to guide the Regmt. to their ground to secure the Forrage with guards.

NB This morning all grenadiers of the Army with the Genl. Off^r of the Day and M. Cadogan Assembled at Pasavanne in order to Attack the Enemy's Bridges and the whole Army had orders to be in Readiness to sustain them but upon the approach of the Grenad. they took up the Bridges leaving a Post still in the Castle of Warcoin on our side of the River which we did not think worth while to ^{be} Master of since it was so near their Army and that every night they might lay Bridges over to it unless we were constantly on our Guard with numbers of Troops. all the Advices we had from the Enemy was, that their designs were to shut up all the Passes of the Scheld and cut off our communications altogether from Brussels that to this effect they were encamping separate Bodies all along the River at several Passes between Tournay &
