N B The Army lay still the Baggage were ordered to the Artillerys. This day our Convoy came off from Ostend in Number about 700 Waggon and M. Webb joins Brig. Sandoperg and Els making in all 24 Batt. near Tortout where he received some advices that the Enemy had sent some Detach. 2 Batt. & 600 Grenadeers to keep Post at Oudenburgh. The Attack our Grenadeers coming much at the same time to take up the Post but they were beat off with loss and our Convoy Passed Safe

The Army had orders to decamp next day, this day the Action at Weynendail happend and as we had the acct. that all our Horse being sent towards hooghhads except a few Sq. to Secure the Convoy from what could come from Ghent believing it pretty safe from Bridges M. Webb who had sent orders to bring of the Batt. and Grenadeers from Oudenburgh received advices that the whole Body of M. Lamotts Army was advancing to him upon the heath between Aeschele
