to the Camp, the Col. with 800 Men was sent to Dixmude to  
get Corn which was to be allow'd in the Contributions, the Lt. Col.  
with 500 Men sent with Mr. Armstrong to cover the Workmen  
who were to endeavor to repair the Dikes and the 200 that went  
with Mr. Spotswood made roads towards Tielt, Roads were likewise  
ordered to be made towards Harlech and Mr. Armstrong went  
to Ostend to prepare things to be sent on Horses through the inund-  
ation.
