Prince Eugenes Army marched likewise and passed both the Fromille and the Lines we had orders at night to send for our Tents

MB The Army moved and we put our selves in Battle to wait for the Enemy, our right between Gemmapree & St. Guillain running by framieres (or framries) towards Grand & Petit Grefres, but Mr Sadogan who had been to reconnitre of Enemy with some of the prince of Hesse squadrons having pushed some of theirs and taken Colonel Shelton with 50 or 60 prisoners bringing word That the Enemy was relieved towards Guicvrain we had orders to Encamp

Sep<sup>r</sup> 9<sup>th</sup>. On our Arms near Blerignies and Bleron Early in the Morning The Duke had Accounts that the Enemy was on the March behind the Bois de Blaugies and towards Engrenne as if they designed to go to Manbenge upon which the prince De.
