April 14<sup>th</sup> The British Troops marched from Ghent under command of Lieut. General Lumley and encamped at Beveren near Oudenarde

15<sup>th</sup> They marched with the Danish Troops to Heikhoven

16<sup>th</sup> To Deltignies. and halted the 17<sup>th</sup>

18<sup>th</sup> They marched and encamped along the Chaussee between Jonto Trefoin and Tournay

19<sup>th</sup> The Troops which were to compose the Duke of Marlbro's Army marched near Tournay and those of prince Eugene's to the plains of Lilly

20<sup>th</sup> Both Armies marched about 5 at night directly to the Enemy's lines on the Denille where Mons<sup>r</sup>. D'Artaguan was encamped with a body of Troops but retired upon our approach

21<sup>st</sup> The Army having passed the lines without any Opposition encamped on the plains of Lens.
