He should be courteous and not too maistere and doyng whateuere he hym comaundely he shuld be good and kyndly and clene, glad and ioyful and playeng, wel willyng and goodly to all maner folkes, saue to wilde beestis vpon whom he shuld be felle spitous and egre.

He shall be good and kindly and clean, glad and joyful and playful, and goodly to all manner of folks save to the wild beasts to whom he should be fierce, spiteful and eager.
